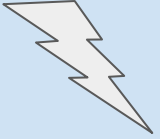

1 Author. 2 “Title of Source”. 3 *Title of container*, 4 Other contributors, 5 Version, 6 Number, 7 Publisher, 8 Publication Date, 9 Location.

Works Cited



MAINTAIN ORDER: Always use this order (and punctuation) when citing a source. Skip the elements that do not pertain to your source.

REPEAT 3-9 for additional containers: Repeat core elements 3-9 for each additional container in your source.

LOCATION? Location refers to the page numbers (print source) or URL (web address) or DOI (digital object identifier)

NOT REQUIRED IN FLIPBOOK

WHAT IS A CONTAINER?

the “container” is the host of the source, the larger collection, or basically where the writer accessed—or found—the source

*Ex: journal/online database/Twitter



Works Cited-Online Journals

Online journals and periodicals are very useful to your research. There many sites to help you find them.

Works Cited-Online Journals

For all online scholarly journals, provide the author(s) name(s), the name of the article in quotation marks, the title of the publication in italics, all volume and issue numbers, and the year of publication. Include a URL, DOI, or permalink to help readers locate the source.

During research, websites in entirety can provide useful information to support your thesis with facts.

Credible Websites

How can I tell if a website is credible?



What to look for:

1. **Author:** A listed author who is willing to stand behind the information. (Look for inclusion of contact info.)
2. **Date:** Information is recent enough to be relevant.
3. **Sources:** Cited information on the website
4. **Site Design:** Good design makes information easily accessible and indication of reliable info.
5. **Writing Style:** Poor spelling/grammar may be a sign of a non-credible site. Credible sites pay attention to writing style closely.



Website Credibility-Domain

- *.com, .org, and .net:* can be purchased and used by an individual.
- *Be careful with .org:* tends to have biased presentation of facts (leaving other important factors out)
- *.edu :* Reserved for colleges/universities
- *.gov:* Reserved for government websites

Website Credibility-

E.S.C.A.P.E



Evidence: facts can be verified (.gov or .com)

Source: Who/what credible source made this page?

Context: What is the bigger picture?

Audience: Who is the intended audience?

Purpose: What is the motivation for this page? Why was it created?

Execution: Is the delivery professional? How is the site made?

Plagiarism

Plagiarism- Unintentional



- *Paraphrasing poorly*: changing a few words without changing the sentence structure of the original, or changing the sentence structure but not the words.
- *Quoting poorly*: putting quotation marks around part of a quotation but not around all of it, or putting quotation marks around a passage that is partly paraphrased and partly quoted.
- *Citing poorly*: omitting an occasional citation or citing inaccurately.

Plagiarism- Intentional



- Claiming pre-written papers from the Internet or other sources.
- Copying an essay or article from the Internet without quoting or giving credit.
- Cutting and pasting from more than one source to create a paper without quoting or giving credit.
- Borrowing words or ideas from other students or sources without giving credit.

Plagiarism- 5 Types



1. **Words:** Another author's word without citation
2. **Structure:** A) Paraphrasing with same sentence construction
B) Changing sentence structure to "paraphrase" words
**Both A & B still use citation!*
3. **Ideas:** Presenting an author's ideas as your own with no credit.
4. **Authorship:** Turning in someone else's work.
5. **Self:** Previous work from another assignment

Plagiarism- Penalties



Can include...

- Zero on the assignment
- In-school discipline
- Suspension
- Expulsion
- Failure of the course

Plagiarism- How to Avoid



BE AUTHENTIC

- Researched info on topic has new and original material
- Use opinions of experts however, EXPAND on the opinions/ideas.
- Give credit to sources/authors
- Follow MLA format

Plagiarism

Plagiarism- How to Avoid

Find what's wrong.

- **The original passage:** Students frequently overuse direct quotation in taking notes, and as a result they overuse quotations in the final research paper. Probably only about 10% of your final manuscript should appear as directly quoted matter.

- **Good Paraphrase:** In research papers students often quote excessively, failing to keep quoted material down to a desirable level. Since the problem usually originates during note taking, it is essential to minimize the material recorded verbatim (Lester, 1976).

- **Bad Paraphrase:** Students often use too many direct quotations when they take notes, resulting in too many of them in the final research paper. In fact, probably only about 10% of the final copy should consist of directly quoted material.
