Rhyme & Structure

 - For example: AABBCCAA
- External Rhyme: when the _____ of poetry rhyme
- Internal Rhyme: when two or more words _____ one line rhyme

Allusion

- Bust of Pallas:
 - Statue of Athena; goddess of war
- Night's Plutonian Shore
 - Referring to Pluto the roman god of the underworld
- Balm in Gilead
 - Gilead is a region referenced in the bible and balm is used for medicinal purpose.
- If within that distant Aidden
 - Another word for Garden of Eden ; hopes for his wife Lenore
