Career

- 1590, Shakespeare writes his first play Henry VI, Part One.
- 1593, publishes “Venus and Adonis” his first sonnet.
- 1598, the writer Francis Meres praises Shakespeare’s work and he now becomes a noted playwright.
- 1609, Publisher Thomas Thorpe prints a collection of 154 of Shakespeare’s sonnets.
- 1613, Shakespeare’s final plays are produced *Henry VIII* and *Two Noble Kinsmen*.
- 1616, Shakespeare passes due to an unknown illness.

Legacy

- Shakespeare's legacy goes beyond what many people think.
- William Shakespeare's legacy includes all of his most famous pieces of literature such as, Macbeth, Romeo and Juliet, and Hamlet.
- Shakespeare's legacy is used in everyday life through his key words, phrases that are not common.
- Shakespeare influences the daily lives of most students in the United States.
- His plays and sonnets have been translated and performed in nearly every major language in the world.
- Shakespeare's name is still being celebrated yearly around the world with festivals and performances of his plays and sonnets.

Second Lost Years (1585-92)

- Twins, Hamnet and Judith were born (1585)
- John Shakespeare removed from the Board of Aldermen (1586)
- Named in a legal action against neighbor John Lambert over land (1589)
- Shakespeare assumes to write parts 1, 2, and 3 of Henry IV (1590-92)
- Henry IV is produced by Strange's Men at the Rose Theater (1592)
- Robert Greene author of Groatsworth of Wit dies (1592)
- Robert Greene's editor apologizes to Shakespeare for Groatsworth of wit (1592)
